Dr Trenita Childers is a senior researcher at the American Institutes for Research. Her work focuses primarily on health equity, social determinants of health, and communicating health information to broad audiences. Dr. Childers also examines how structural barriers — such as discriminatory policies and practices — worsen inequality. In her book, "In Someone Else's County: Anti-Haitian Racism and Citizenship in the Dominican Republic", Dr. Childers uses ethnography to connect race, labor, and immigration. She has extensive expertise conducting community engaged research, especially among marginalized populations including racial and ethnic minorities and immigrant communities. Dr. Childers is a Davidson College graduate with a PhD in sociology from Duke University.

Elizabeth Hordge Freeman University of South Florida

Dr Elizabeth Hordge-Freeman is Associate Professor of Sociology at the University of South Florida. She received her B.A. from Cornell University and her M.A./Ph.D. in Sociology from Duke University. She is the author of The Color of Love: Racial Features, Stigma, and Socialization in Black Brazilian Families (2015, UT Press), which received three book awards including from the American Sociological Association Section on Emotions, ASA Section on Body and Embodiment, and the Society for the Study of Symbolic Interactionism. The Color of Love is the topic of her 2015 TEDx talk and has since been translated into Portuguese. Additionally, she has published widely in leading journals including the Journal of Marriage and Family, Ethnic and Racial Studies, and Qualitative Research, among others. In 2016, she co-edited the book Race and the Politics of Knowledge Production: Diaspora and Black Transnational Scholarship in the USA and Brazil (Palgrave). With the support of a Fulbright grant to Brazil and the ASA Funds for the Advancement of the Discipline, Hordge-Freeman recently published a new book in 2022, Second-Class Daughters:

Informal Adoptions as Modern Slavery in Brazil (Cambridge University Press). This book was awarded the 2023 American Sociological Association, Section on Race, Gender, and Class, Distinguished Contribution to Scholarship Book Award. Dr. Hordge-Freeman teaches courses on Racial & Ethnic Studies, Comparative Racial Stratification, Sociology of Families, and Race, Gender and Labor in Brazil/Latin America. Her community-engaged teaching – including her creation of the USF in Bahia, Brazil – has been recognized with awards from regional, state, and national levels. In 2020, Hordge-Freeman led the development of the Anti-Racism Initiative at the University of South Florida as part of her role as the inaugural Senior Advisor to the President and Provost for Diversity and Inclusion and later as Interim Vice President of Institutional Equity. Most recently, she launched a new interdisciplinary collaboration on Instagram with her husband, McArthur Freeman, entitled Imagine Blackness AI, which combines artificial intelligence, art, and sociology to produce images inspired by speculative fiction and Afro-Futurism
